

Route Fact File	
Location:	A few miles west of Selby, just west of Brayton village and south-east of Thorpe Willoughby.
Difficulty:	One Boot
Route Length:	1¼ Miles / 2 Kilometres
Walking Time:	45 Minutes
Terrain & Gradient:	The entire route follows a hard and well- surfaced path, with a consistent 2 metre width. Mostly gently undulating, however some sections are quite steep.
How To Get There:	By car: Our free car park is located off Barff Lane, just west of Brayton (please note there is a 2 metre height barrier).
	From Selby: Follow the A19 heading west. Stay on the A19 as it branches to the left by the town hall. After about 11/2 miles, turn right onto Barff Lane. After about a mile, the car park is on your left.
	By public transport: There are bus stops within walking distance of Brayton Barff.
	For up to date travel information from any location visit google maps to search directions.

In the open valley of Pickering, this route flows through ancient woodland and is a great spot for bird watching and spring bluebells. Several other footpaths branch off to take you exploring through the woods or climbing towards the summit, which is the highest point for miles within an area dominated by flat agricultural land. Please note: these extra paths are less suitable for wheelchairs and pushchairs.

Route Description:

Starting from the car park (**point 1**), walk through the gap in the fence by the noticeboards to join the start of the path. This takes you clockwise around the Barff. Keep following the footpath all the way round – there is not much navigation involved in this route so you can relax and take in the beautiful surroundings!

At **point 2**, the path meets a tarmac access road; cross the road to continue on the path. Please note: the next section up to point 3 is the steepest climb on the route. The path then bears right and takes you back towards the car park (**point 1**).
