

Tophill Low Nature Reserve Education Centre

This leaflet contains information to help you prepare for your visit to Yorkshire Water.

Education Centre Advisers

Our Education Centre visits are run by dedicated colleagues who either have a water industry or educational background. Our Education Advisers are well-prepared to adapt language and activities to suit all our visitors – whether it be primary, secondary, university students or special interest groups. Each member of the team has received an enhanced certificate from the Disclosure and Barring Service. All primary school visits will be led by one of our Education Advisers.

Education Centre Visits

Our visits are suitable for all ages from 7 years upwards. Visitors with special needs are welcomed at Tophill Low Nature Reserve and we can accommodate wheelchair access across the majority of the site.

The school should provide sufficient adults to meet our minimum required ratio:

Our Education facility is opened for pre-planned visits only. Visit co-ordinators wishing to undertake a pre-visit check/risk assessment should contact our Education Team to make suitable arrangements. Classes visiting for the full day will be able to use our classroom for lunch. Public toilets are available on site and include hand washing facilities.

Safety on Site

- Please note that the Education Centre is located on a nature reserve which is open to the general public.
- Some areas may have vehicle movements including the car park and entrance / access road.
- The classroom is a designated area for pre-booked visits only and due to fire regulations, has an occupancy limit of 45. As a result, we would only take one group booking per session.
- Safety precautions are an essential part of your visit. We have prepared a Risk Assessment for your information and can confirm that our Health and Safety Team have authorised the route/activities undertaken by visitors.
- Students and adults are advised to wear suitable footwear and clothing for an outdoor visit (flat shoes and warm, outdoor clothing/waterproofs). Hi-Vis waistcoats will be made available so we can identify primary students as they undertake activities around the reserve. Long trousers and long sleeves are recommended due to the presence of nettles near paths.
- Visiting groups are asked to bring a qualified First Aider. A basic first aid kit is located at the Education Centre.
- Risk is very limited. Visitors are chaperoned at all times by our Education Centre Adviser. Barriers and mesh separate visitors from any areas of high hazard. A safety talk is given at the start of every session and is compulsory. Please ensure that any warning notices and safety signs are observed.
- Due to the outdoor nature of your visit, please be aware of the weather conditions hot and sunny weather or sudden storms may occur.
- Finally, you should be aware that contractors, Yorkshire Water employees and reserve volunteers, may be on site undertaking maintenance / building work.

Our education centres are located on or near operational treatment works, which are no-smoking/no vaping locations. Any tours where individuals are found to be smoking or vaping on site will be cancelled with immediate effect.

Included with your confirmation email are links to forms on our education portal – please complete these at least 10 working days before your planned visit.

10. Insect borne disease	Visitors	There is the potential for transmission of diseases such as Ticks Lymes Disease in forest and woodland areas. To prevent any risk of infection, visitors should be encouraged to wear long trousers and long sleeves. Light coloured clothing will make the ticks more visible. 11. Food Hygiene & Lunchtime Supervision	Visitors	Lunch facilities for full day visits will be provided and the tour party are asked to eat in the designated area. 12. Fire/Explosion	Visitors	Education Advisers are briefed on the fire evacuation procedures. A Fire Risk Assessment is in place incorporating actions when visitors are on site. 14. Drowning or engulfment	Visitors	The designated tour route includes a pond dipping area. There is a designated dipping point with a permanently mounted throw line as a rescue aid. No pond dipping to take place at other locations of the reserve.	Action: Group leaders must ensure adequate supervision of student/adults at all times.
15. Smoking & vaping	Visitors	This site is a 'no-smoking' and no 'vaping' location. Any tours where individuals are found to be smoking or vaping on site will be cancelled with immediate effect.	Action: Group leaders to note that visits may be cancelled with immediate effect if individuals are found smoking/vaping on site.
